ADJUSTING TO NEW CHALLENGES IN HAITI

he past year in Haiti was like no other. For a country that already struggles with so much hardship, 2021 brought the assassination of President Jovenel Moise, another devastating earthquake, skyrocketing costs, fuel shortages, and rising insecurity. During HOM's last Board meeting, Superintendent of Schools Jacqueline Dorleans put it plainly: "This is the darkest time in Haiti that I have experienced during my lifetime."

These challenges have meant the continued suspension of team travel to Haiti. Many of you have asked when teams can return to Haiti, and HOM Founding Director Leon Dorleans has stated that his "crystal ball is broken" as to when that return can happen. Volunteer safety and security is our absolute highest concern, and we rely on Leon and other Haitian leaders to provide the best assessment of the circumstances on the ground in Haiti. Unfortunately, we anticipate that HOM will not be able to welcome mission teams again until national elections are held, a new president is elected, and there is a prolonged period of stability in Haiti.

Despite these challenges, we see God at work in our ministry in bountiful ways. Our Haitian colleagues have been unfailing in their commitment to keeping students in school, to providing spiritual care and support, and to delivering vital health care. Here are just a few of the ways that our programs continue to make a difference:

• Churches: Due to security concerns in Cité Soleil, one of the Sunday services was moved to the Terre Noire church. A

smaller service still takes place in Cité Soleil each week. Weekly church attendance is strong as our Haitian brothers and sisters remain steadfast in their faith in our merciful God.

- Schools: Also due to security concerns, the Cité Soleil students now attend school at Terre Noire. Jacky and her staff creatively adjusted the daily schedule, which allows Cité Soleil students to attend classes in the mornings and Terre Noire students to attend classes in the afternoons.
- Clinic: The clinic continues to operate out of the Terre Noire campus, in the building formerly used by Family Health Ministries. With recent fuel shortages, the clinic moved to an abbreviated schedule, seeing and treating patients three days per week.
- Construction: As you will read in this newsletter, our construction crew continues to be able to meet our needs by constructing a classroom building at Baryè Fè and initial buildings on the Espwa Campus.

We all miss Haiti – serving together on construction sites or in the medical clinic, hearing the students sing each morning before school and seeing their shy waves at American friends, visiting sponsored students, and praying together with our Haitian brothers and sisters. While Leon's crystal ball for a return date may not be working right now, what remains unchanged is our shared belief and commitment in a better tomorrow for Haiti. We are so grateful for the dedication of our Haitian colleagues and for your continued prayers. Together, we will not give up on Haiti!

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A MESSAGE FROM WICK SMITH - HOM BOARD CHAIR

n the fall, I watched a pair of birds building their nest in the tree in my front yard. They landed on other nearby trees and bushes, examined an array of branches and

stems, and then chose one that seemed to meet their specifications, breaking it off and taking it to the nest. It was slow, methodical work. One branch at a time. MASTAS PROJECT MAKING PROGRESS

021 was a year of discovery, learning and growth for the MASTAS project. (MASTAS is Creole for "Healthy Moms, Healthy Children.") We entered the year with a newly hired Project Coordinator, Annaus Frankel, who formally worked at a clinic in Repatriote and was eager to continue serving the families of the area. By summer, Annaus and his team had visited every household, talking to families about the project and completing a census of Repatriote. The census results shed new light on the situation in

the area. In Repatriote, families suffer from severe un- and underemployment; only one of three adults has regular work. Low education levels are prevalent throughout, with a third of adults having completed high school. The average monthly salary for a household is \$49, with a quarter going to health services each month.

Basic health infrastructure is lacking. The closest health facility is privately owned and often too costly for families. Prior to the pandemic, MICECC provided mobile health services at the Repatriote campus each week; however, those have been on hold due to COVID-19 government regulations. Only 10% of households have a place to wash their hands, and 21% of families lack access to a latrine and so still defecate in the open. From our initial data collection, it was clear that Repatriote is an area of high need with significant barriers. It is also an area with a great potential to improve the health of mothers and children through health education, support, and community action.

Data from the census was complemented with interviews with members of newly formed health committees, MICECC clinical staff, and government health workers to get their insights on the greatest issues affecting mothers and children in the area. Census data was shared with the community to create awareness and generate buy-in for the program.

We closed 2021 with preparation for the programs that will roll out in 2022. In December, Annaus and his team underwent extensive training in the Care Group methodology, an evidencebased behavior change intervention that empowers mothers to become health leaders and educators in their neighborhoods. In summer 2022, we plan to deploy Community Health Workers to regularly visit families with young children - helping to both prevent illness in the household and refer sick and malnourished children for care.

Working in Haiti this past year has not been without its challenges. The MASTAS team has encountered many barriers due to political unrest, a presidential assassination, increased

violence, and lack of access to basic commodities, such as fuel to power the clinic and program office. Throughout these struggles, we continue to be guided and inspired by their dedication and determination to bring health to their communities. In 2022, MASTAS will continue to build the project from the ground up, in difficult circumstances. We remain committed to working alongside them and look forward to the impact the project will have on the health families of Repatriote.

The MASTAS project is a partnership between HOM, MICECC, and Curamericas Global, a relief and development organization focused on helping underserved communities make measurable and sustainable improvements in their health & well-being.

CHURCH SPOTLIGHT: MT. SYLVAN UNITED METHODIST CHURCH by Darlene Lumpkin

t. Sylvan is a United Methodist Church in northern Durham, NC. We were first introduced to Haiti Outreach Ministries by Scot and Cheryl Catlin who

were members of our church. Scot led our first team to Haiti in January, 2004. Since then we have sent about 10 teams. Our teams are typically 5-12 people.

For our trip in 2008, we collected and took 80 wedding dresses for the wedding closet. Now every time we visit, we have a couple of beautiful dresses show up to go with us!

In July of 2010, we built a house in the community of Terre Noire. Leon always expressed to enjoy the community while we were there, so we loved the little ones visiting Rise Against Hunger us and playing hand games or simply touching our hair. Folks in the community were kind and grateful. The work was hard and the heat in July was unbelievable, but the joy of the Haitians was infectious and our hearts locked forever.

This was the year of the earthquake, so the kids were still in school. Each morning as the children arrived we could see them line up to enter their classrooms and hear them sing before they entered the school. Terre Noire is so alive when the kids are in school!

Our first trip with youth was in 2014. This visit we decided our project would be beginning construction on the kitchen

at Cite Solei church. This work was strenuous to say the least, but we worked hard and rested well at night. We have been able as a church to fund this feeding ministry since the

kitchen was completed. We also had the opportunity on our next visit to help prepare and serve in this kitchen. One of our church's gifts to the world is

feeding. Ironically, our lunch breaks were in the storage room with the Rise Against Hunger meals, which we pack every November as a church.

Our last trip was July 2018 and we spent part of the week painting at the Repatriote campus. If you remember this summer, you might remember most people were leaving Haiti, but Pastor Leon said we were safe so made the trip. The flight attendants really made it clear that the return flights were full, and our flight was empty for a reason. Pastor Leon had been holding a class that week and invited us to join him as they sang and

danced thru the community. It was a real joy to dance in the streets. Our pastor and congregation were concerned about us in Haiti, but we sent video of our dancing in the street and then they began to trust we were safe.

We cherish our visits from Pastor Leon, Pastor Luc, Pastor Profaite and Nadege. We support the pastors' fund in general and sponsor a child at Baryè Fè. Several members sponsor children as well. Our ministry with Haiti Outreach Ministries has been a vital part of our spiritual growth for our church. No one has ever returned the same. Praise be to God.

CONSTRUCTION UPDATE

OVERVIEW

This past six months has been very challenging for the Construction Group. While tasked with two major projects and several minor projects, Haiti's continuing unrest, massive inflation and the COVID-19 pandemic provided a challenging backdrop. With the absence of all visiting construction teams, funding was pared down significantly. We were blessed that several teams sent funds for work, especially building houses in the community but the Construction Group and the visiting teams missed valuable person to person interaction.

MAJOR COMPLETED PROJECTS

Major initiatives included:

- 1. The ongoing development of the master plan at the Espwa Campus. Work included drilling the campus water well, construction of a gate keeper's cottage, the construction of the generator/clean water building and construction of a laydown pad for the Extollo training site.
- 2. The completion of the 3rd classroom at Baryè Fè, and the ongoing conceptual design of the new kitchen and additional toilets at Baryè Fè, and
- **3.** Completion of the exterior second floor of the Youth building at Repatriote.

MAJOR PROJECTS PLANNED

This year will be a busy one for the Construction Group. Design is underway for the construction of the next one story classroom building, a student toilet and permanent kitchen at Baryè Fè. All will be needed next fall. At Espwa the gate keeper will move onsite to provide 24 hour security, a temporary generator will be installed and the campus's clean water system will be installed. New construction at Espwa will be the first phase of the Bible College and enlarging the Extollo training site. With the inflation rate on imported and local goods varying from 10% - 75% this past year, we can only hope that inflation will somehow reduce in the coming year.

IN REVIEW

Looking back at 2021 the total construction dollars put in place by the group this year is \$903,642 US, which is the highest construction total in the past 11 years.

To date, since the earthquake the Construction Group has put in place almost **\$7 million** of new and updated construction providing over **161,000** man days of employment the past 11 years.

CLINIC CORNER by Janet Horton, FNP

- The clinic is currently fully operational, bouncing back from November when we were only open 3 days a week due to the high cost of fuel/gasoline. The biggest challenge is the high cost of everything in Haiti, and our inability to ship supplies and meds due to the gang activity. We are blessed that a pharmacist, a long-time supporter, donated many of the most needed and hardest to find medicines and supplies which Leon took back in October.
- We have had several staff changes in the last 6 months; the clinic staff was devastated by the death of Dr. Page, Ob-Gyn, but very excited that Dr. Jean Rochny Baptistin, the Ob-Gyn who covered for Dr. Merilus while she was on maternity leave, agreed to stay on. Dr. St. Germaine, DDS and Dr. Vilsaint, MD choose to relocate to the U.S. in the fall. We are blessed that our dentist position was filled quickly. Dr. Walter Josissaint, DDS
- hit the ground running. He is well liked by staff and patients and has had no problems adjusting to the space and equipment we have. The MD position is currently filled by a friend of Dr. Solon while candidates are interviewed for the position. The good news is that we have several excellent candidates.
- COVID remains a concern as do the challenges presented by political instability and gang activity. Patients have a difficult time getting to the clinic but as several other health facilities have closed, the Terre Noire clinic remains busy. We continue to provide quality care including pediatric care and vaccines, prenatal care, general care and dental and oral health care
- Dr. Solon will begin his second year with us in February. He has done an amazing job given all the challenges he has faced. He is actively helping

with the MASTAS project and continuing to establish a relationship with the hospital Fontaine in Repatriote. He is also starting a Volunteer Nurse mentorship program for graduate nurses. They will work as volunteers to gain needed experience for employment, a win-win for everyone. Finally, Anilus Jean, RN (serves as our pharmacist) has been given increased responsibility as an assistant to Dr. Solon to help with the administrative work.

Clinic Needs

Financial contributions to the clinic are much appreciated as skyrocketing inflation in Haiti on medical supplies and pharmaceuticals coupled with the absence of teams bringing supplies has been a real burden on the clinic.
