Our vision is to develop **self-sustaining communities** that help people become the individuals God intended them to be. We achieve this through programs that address the spiritual, mental, physical, and economic needs of our Haitian brothers and sisters.

### PROGRAMMATIC IMPACT



#### **EDUCATION**

**2,122 STUDENTS** enrolled in four schools and local universities. Over **1,600 US SPONSORS** made education possible for these students.

## **ECONOMIC IMPACT**

In 2022, HOM conducted four major construction projects. This included: adding a kitchen, classrooms, and computer lab to the Barvè Fè secondary school. constructing essential buildings and amenities on the Espwa Campus, advancing the Youth Building on the Repatriote Campus, and improving offices and infrastructure on the Terre Noire Campus. 100% of purchasing was done in Haiti, creating economic impact in the following ways:



# INDIVIDUAL IMPACT: ONE STUDENT'S STORY

In 1990, Dr. Benoucheca Pierre was a student in the very first class at the Cité Soleil primary school. Today she is the Chief of the Intensive Care Unit at **Mirebalais University Hospital** in Haiti. While her primary school days are long behind her, Dr. Pierre says she fondly remembers how "the school was like a family" and its emphasis on both knowledge and strong values, recalling "I learned things that other kids didn't." The solid educational foundation she received at the Cité Soleil school paved the way for entry into a competitive local high school, medical studies at Notre Dame University, and a prestigious

fellowship in France, training in anesthesiology and critical care. Dr. Pierre is one of only two intensivists (critical care doctors) in Haiti. She could be working anywhere but is committed to serving her country.

"When one invests in education, one invests in the future," says Dr. Pierre. "As a young girl, I had no idea I would become a doctor. But access to education created roots that took hold and set in motion my future. I am grateful."
